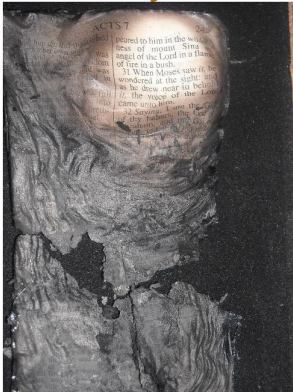

Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ!

My name is Gloria P. Dubberly, Dayspring Walk to Emmaus #47, Table of Rebecca. I will be serving as the Women's Lay Director for Dayspring Walk to Emmaus #73, which will be held September 16th - 19th. I have had the honor and privilege to serve along

residence on Price Williams Road in northwest Emanuel County. According to Emanuel County Sheriff J. Tyson Stephens, upon arrival, officials learned that a vehicle on the property was fully engulfed in flames and was possibly occupied. Fire crews extinguished the blaze and confirmed the existence of a human body [remains . . . enough to put in a grocery sack according to Chief Deputy Joel Beecher] inside the vehicle. Further investigation revealed that Brenda K. Kirby, age 60, of Kite, occupied the vehicle. She was pronounced dead at the scene." That information comes from an article first published in The Forest Blade on August 10, 2010. There is more to the story, however.

Ms. Kirby may have passed out while driving. We may never know for sure. But those who investigated the accident conclude that the car came to rest at an embankment and continued to run until the catalytic converter got so hot it caught the bushes beneath the vehicle on fire. The car and all its contents were completely consumed, burned beyond recognition. All, that is, except a small part of a Bible which was resting on the front passenger seat.

The cover and most all the pages of Ms. Kirby's Bible were burned to ashes. But

I would also like to thank my husband and family for the encouragement you have given me, which has enable me to serve our Lord and Savior. To the conference room teams and the behind the scenes teams, I thank you for your dedication and commitment as servants to the pilgrims in the upcoming walks. To the Dayspring Community and my reunion group (Babe Chicks), thank you for your continued prayers, words of encouragement, and faithfulness. I would also like to thank a special group of women: the previous Lay Directors with whom I have had the opportunity to serve. You are exceptional women and have been influential in my life and have helped me to grow as a Christian. Isn't it amazing how God uses the Body of Christ to equip someone like myself for service?

As I reflect on my Walk to Emmaus which I attended in March 2004, I definitely came into the walk open-minded, but very nervous about what to expect. As the weekend progressed, I was amazed how the ladies and gentlemen giving the talks were so composed, radiant and eloquent. WOW - were they professionals brought in just for me? No, they were people like you and I with messages that I needed to hear. It was exactly what I needed. The Lord certainly used them to get my attention. I began to reflect on my relationship with God and knew there was hope for me and the future ahead. I was honest about things in my life and opened my heart to hear from God as I focused on being a lifelong servant for Him. As I journeyed along the road to Emmaus, I was able to relate to the story in Luke and felt gratitude for what my Savior did for me on Calvary. It flooded my soul; and, I was overwhelmed with joyous emotion. I was able to be freed from my burdens and receive the peace that only God can give which surpasses all understanding. I was so grateful for my husband, our three children, our home and my life--including the failures and victories. My friends, my walk to Emmaus was a life changing experience (a spiritual cleansing, if you will) and it has never been the same since. Please don't get me wrong, troubles have come my way, and the roller coaster ride has been and will continue to be unpredictable. However, when I trust my Lord and Savior, He always gets me through whatever life throws my way. The tools I gathered from my Emmaus Walk - praying, reading the Bible, studying the Word, being in fellowship with other Christians (at church & reunion group), doing for and serving others,

one small, round portion of a page, about the size of a silver dollar was raised up on top of other burned pages resting on what was left beneath it like a message on top of a small butte. The text was readable without moving anything. It comes from the 7th Chapter of the Book of Acts and included a portion of verse 30, all of 31, and a portion of verse 32. The excerpt is from Stephen's testimony before the Sanhedrin after he had been arrested and accused of blasphemy.

He recounted the history of God coming again and again to his people ... and how they had consistently resisted the Holy Spirit. The speech led to his death by stoning. The passage visible besides Ms. Kirby's remains read as follows: "There appeared to him in the wilderness of Mt. Sinai an angel of the Lord in a flame of fire in a bush. When Moses saw it, he wondered at the sight; and as he drew near to behold it, the voice of the Lord came to him, saying: I am the God of thy fathers, the God of Abraham and the God ..."

Bobby actually saw the Bible. It was just as it appears in the picture attached to this email. And I think it's a "sign."

I think God continues, even today, to approach us in simplicity and mystery. The

listening for the Lord - are effective ways that I get through life. The saying, "God got me to it and He will get me through it!" is so true. I have seen the evidence of God's presence and how he has blessed my life. I pray that God will continue to use me to be His hands and feet in this world even if it requires me to step outside my comfort zone. Sometime this is difficult for me, but I have faith in God and He has always been faithful in my life and in this Emmaus Community. When I think about all the lives He has touched through the Emmaus ministry, I can't help but realize what a faithful God I serve. He shows up for each Emmaus Walk, not only for the pilgrims, but for the willing servants as well. I pray that we, as a community, always remember to thank God for His faithfulness. Again, it is a privilege for me to serve as the Lay Director for the Women's Walk #73. God not only gave me the opportunity to serve, but He also blessed me with the chance to work with many of His faithful servants and make new friends along the way. I know that Christ is counting on me; and, I am counting on Christ!

Pilgrim's Progress~

Lessons Learned in Sorrow From the Heart of a Weeping Mother

It was a beautiful day, July 4, 2007 in Bulloch County, Georgia. I remember so clearly walking in the yard admiring the beauty of God's handiwork-the beautiful flowers, the soft breeze, the birds. It was as if someone were walking beside me as I walked alone in the front yard. It was an exhilarating feeling, walking about the yard and being so thankful for the time off in the summer to admire God's creation. Our bags were packed and we were ready to head to Atlanta at a moment's notice. We were going to keep my almost 2 year old grandson while his new brother or sister was born. Those were my plans. I didn't know God had other things in store. I realized later that day that it was Someone whose presence I felt walking beside me outside. It must have been God's Angel as if saying, "I am here walking beside you today."

Being very uplifted, I went inside and commented to David about how beautiful the day had been. The phone rang and David answered. I could tell he was startled. The shock on his face was disturbing. He hung up the phone and came and hugged me and said, "Ann, it's bad. Ann, it's bad." I thought to myself, "What is bad? You don't understand, this has been a beautiful day. Our bags are packed and tomorrow is my birthday and maybe my grandchild will be born then!" Then as he revealed more about the phone call, I remember going numb-it is actually God's way of insulating us in such times. He said there had been an accident and that our youngest son's vehicle was involved in a single car accident. There was no identification to be found, but they thought it was my son, Jeffrey, age 32, that was hurt. We need to go to the hospital immediately. Another phone call or two and it was confirmed that there was an accident and I needed to come to the hospital as soon as possible. By this time, I was not in emotional shape to drive to the hospital. Our family members and some of our close friends were either in the mountains or at the sea on this holiday. Our neighbors on all sides and down the street were out of town, we knew. David said, "I'll call Jo." She is home, she'll drive us to the hospital. We waited and our dear friend, "Saint Jo" drove us to the hospital. Going into the hospital and being somewhat in denial of what was happening, I kept repeating, "He's going to be all right. He's going to be all right." A lady met my husband and me at the Emergency Room door and explained that she was the hospital chaplain and that we needed to go to the chapel and pray for what I was about to see. The 23rd Psalm came to my mind, and I repeated it to myself all the way down the never ending hall. We went into the hospital chapel and she revealed to us that the accident had been fatal. Gasping for breath, David and I were then led to the door of the hospital morgue by the assistant county coroner. He said he needed me to identify a body that is possibly my son, since the vehicle involved was registered to him. "What?" My legs became very heavy and I remember almost losing consciousness. "How can this be?" This must be every mother's nightmare. Suddenly, however, an unexplained and unexpected strength came over me as I stood there and looked in total disbelief and complete horror. For the first time ever, I was thankful that David, my husband who is now blind, could not see. As I stood there and looked, it was my dear Jeffrey, and Oh, what heartache! How can this be? Happening all at the same time however, I will never forget how close I felt to God. It was as if He had stepped down from Heaven and was saying-"you have been chosen to share this with me, as I gave up my only Son for you." I felt as if I were at the cross and there was my child I was having to give up. This was becoming a shared experience with the God of Heaven! I was so humbled that God chose to reveal those thoughts to me at such a time. It actually scared me. I was so shocked by the revelation and the sacredness of those moments.

I loved my children so much and had been such an overprotective mother. I had always struggled with the concept of how God could have given up his Child-his only Son for all of us. This was indeed a crash course in "Divine Sorrow." Wow, what I had to learn so quickly, so divinely! I realized in those few moments that I had to trust God on this or I wouldn't and couldn't make it through this. David and I were led to a little room and Jo had found us after finding a parking place. So much had happened in those few MINUTES. God always provides, and He had provided an "angel" in Jo McKanna to be there with us, to drive for us, and lead us through the process of what we had ahead of us. (She had lost her husband in 2002 unexpectedly, but differently). She had her phone and we had to make that first dreadful phone call to my older son who lives in Atlanta whose baby was due any minute and tell him about his "little brother." "Are we going to have a funeral and a baby born at the same time? What a dilemma! I thought I was a strong woman and I know God is in control, but Lord this is tough."

During that very long and sleepless night, I began to try to sort things out and realize that God had not caused this, yet it was allowed, so I had to accept this. I began to look for the blessings-No one else was hurt, it was just one vehicle involved. My last words to him in a phone call had been ended as always, "I Love You." It happened very close to home. Jeffrey is still single-no wife or children to have to bear this too. It is summer and at least there is some time to deal with this without worrying about my class and their needs at school. Momentarily after those thoughts, the questions began. "Oh, God, I have a grandbaby due any minute, how

can all this happen at once? Oh, God, my son just lost his father six weeks ago to cancer, how can he lose his brother, now? His baby is due any minute! Who is going to tell his Grandmother that her grandchild who had just moved in with her to look after her was killed in an automobile accident when she just lost her only son six weeks ago? And do you remember, God, that we went to North Carolina and buried my husband's brother a few months ago. What are we going to handle first? How can I go back to teaching in less than a month dealing with all this? I must say so much was happening, it was almost scary about what might happen next. This must be one of life's "perfect storms."

Stranger indeed were the thoughts to God, "Is this how you are answering my prayers?" I prayed every morning for my children and especially for his will to be done in Jeffrey's life, and Oh, Lord, please help him!!! I would beg. Is this the answer to those prayers?? Jeffrey had been the one who had introduced me to a book by Dr. James Dobson, *Holding Onto Your Faith When God Doesn't Make Sense*. How can this be, that my child that I just had to give up in such a shocking sudden way had earlier shared this book with me that would minister to me to help me heal from his own death? I had to surrender all this to God and realize that as much as I loved him, God's will is done and He wanted him more. God's ways are way above ours and I had to understand that!

Well, in the midst of that awful storm, the very next day a ray of light appeared as the phone rang and my daughter-in-law was being admitted to the hospital in Atlanta with labor pains. Six hours later, I had a granddaughter who was born on my birthday-just as Jeffrey hoped it would happen. I feel this was God's way of lightening my load in the midst of this awful storm. Finally, my older son will be able to come home now. He needs to be here, too. My daughter-in-law's mother and sister will take care of her, the new baby, my grandson, and everything going on in Atlanta. Still, it was overwhelming, dealing with the shock of this tragedy, planning a funeral for a child, and having a new grandbaby born all in the span of twenty-six hours. How awful, how sorrowful, how sweet, how divine!!! God, you are in control here, not me!

I remember so clearly, the words that my dear sister in Christ, Jane Cason said to me when she came by my house the day after Jeffrey's death (she had lost her young son many years ago). We were sitting on a bench in my foyer together shedding tears, and she said to me, "You know you have been chosen for this, don't you?" "Chosen?" "What a strange comment," I thought. Then, I wondered to myself, being startled by her insight, "She knows, too. Maybe there are lessons God teaches some mothers who lose their children." I trusted Jane and I had witnessed God's strength given to her as she stood and read the 23rd Psalm at the funeral of her child. This woman of experience had come to minister to me.

I went through the motions of grief and was overcome with sorrow especially in the days following the funeral, but I learned from this experience that God is true to his word. He will never forsake you. Even in the midst of such shock, such awe, such pain, God was there and I could feel His presence with me. He knew I could not bear this alone. I told myself that I have friends that have lost a child, they had made it, surely with God's help I can bear this. I had a God-given faith even from childhood-I learned to trust Him--I had to--losing both my parents in early childhood, going through a divorce with two young boys, a child (this child) who had struggled with an addiction problem, and a husband who has lost his eyesight and the many life changes that brought, and then the biggest challenge of all--this-losing a child! "Through it all," I have learned and I do know that God gives a "peace that passes all understanding." Even in the midst of "perfect storms." He is able and He holds our hand. As our "Sounds of Grace" group at church often sings, "'Til the storm passes by, keep me safe, 'til the storm passes by."

Elder Randy Waters, our pastor, said in one of his sermons recently that, "Sorrow is God's graduate program." As soon he said it, I said to myself, "Amen, on that." I have learned that sorrow is advanced studies in Real Life Experience that cannot be learned any other way.

I have wanted to share this story with others, but I know that I still can't trust my emotions, and tears are always just beneath the surface. (I haven't been able to wear mascara since then). I am hoping that writing this will help someone else going through "life's storms." I know time has a way of healing, and I'll never get over this, but God has given me strength to go on "with it" with peace in my heart. I feel so extremely blessed and humbled to have been given and shown a portion of God's divine grace and wisdom even with a broken heart.

July 4 will bring back many precious as well as painful memories, but I will also quietly celebrate the "divine" lessons God chose to reveal to me in such unexpected and powerful ways. Often I go by the cemetery and find a painful yet sweet spot engraved with "Forever in Our Hearts" and read the little stepping stone I placed there. "No farewell words were spoken, no time to say "good-by, You were gone before we Knew it, And only God knows why." It has now been two years since that awful "storm." I have retired from teaching. I am blessed to be able to spend time with my husband who has been gifted with a good attitude after losing his eyesight. Again this July 4, "if the Lord is willing," I will pack our bags and we will go to Atlanta because... we have a birthday to celebrate that I share with my granddaughter (who friends say looks just like me). ...I still have many lessons to learn, but with God as my Divine Instructor, progress will be made.
